


GET ORGANIZED

- All workers must view the safety videotape at <u>www.dot.wisconsin.gov</u> See Adopt-a-Highway Safety Tips Video.
- Review the safety rules with all workers before cleaning the highway segment.
- Organize the work crews before you load the carpool.
- Always have an adult supervisor for each crew of 5-6 workers.
- The supervisor is the safety watchdog to monitor traffic during the cleanup and tell workers of potential hazards.
- The supervisor keeps the workers together as a team.
- Be prepared with a first aid kit.
- Know where your nearest hospital or emergency room is located and the best way to get there before you begin work.
- Know where the nearest telephone or cellular phone is located if you should need help.

- ♦ Know the physical condition and special needs of your crew.
- Have an adequate supply of vests and trash bags.

WHAT TO WEAR

- Always wear your safety vest.
- Wear hiking boots or shoes with thick soles to prevent foot damage.



- Protect yourself from ticks in the grass by tucking your pant cuffs into your socks or boots. Check your body for ticks as soon as possible when you get home.
- If you are sensitive to the sun, bring along a cap or wide-brim hat, a long sleeve shirt and sun screen lotion.
- ♦ No headphones (i-pods, etc.)

TRANSPORTATION



- ◆ Carpool to your highway segment to use as few vehicles as possible.
- Park parallel to the road, at least 3
 feet away from the pavement
 surface before unloading your
 crew. Better yet, park off the
 shoulder of a side road.

 Stop and post the "person working" signs at both ends of your highway segment, before unloading your crew.

WHEN YOU ARE ON THE SITE

- Never walk or pick up litter on the pavement or in the median
- Never work on bridges, tunnels, overpasses or steep ground.
- ♦ Stay off parked equipment.
- ♦ Stay alert for snakes, poison ivy and stinging insects.
- ♦ Avoid overexertion.



- Bring lots of water to drink while you work, especially on hot, humid days.
- Alcoholic beverages should not be permitted on the site.
- Park on the same side of the road that you plan to work.
- Always work facing the traffic.
- Drive your crew to the other side of the road when they switch sides.

- Do not allow the crew to walk across the pavement.
- Avoid substances causing you allergic reactions.



HANDLING THE LITTER

- Do not touch or pick up anything you cannot identify. It may be a hazardous item. Instead, note the location. Examples are car batteries, medical waste, hypodermic needles, sharp or heavy items, dead animals or chemicals that are often in closed containers.
- List location of hazardous items on the group cleanup report postcard.
 If the items seem immediately dangerous or illegal, notify the police as soon as possible.
- Do not jump or step on the trash bag to pack more in. Begin a new bag instead.
- Place filled trash bags in small groups near the road shoulder or

- collect them and drop them at the collection site.
- Groups are encouraged to bag recyclables, bring them to a recycling center and keep any cash from the sale of these items.
- When you are finished, lead the crew into the cars and take your "person working" signs with you so they will be available for your next cleanup.
