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According to the Centers for Disease Control, childhood experiences impact adult actions and choices by affecting brain development. Adverse, or negative, childhood experiences can impair social, emotional and cognitive development, which increases risks for disease such as addiction issues, health problems, low life potential and even early death. These experiences, whether it be abuse, neglect, the loss of a loved one, financial stress or any unavoidable traumatic event, can have an impact on how young brains grow. These experiences are more common than you think. ACEs include living with someone who has a mental illness or chronic health condition, divorce, neglect, poverty, death, abuse, and more. As an ACE score increases, so does the risk of serious health, social, and emotional issues.

**Presenter: Tim Grove** - Tim is the chief clinical officer at SaintA. He is responsible for the implementation of SaintA's trauma informed care philosophy and practices, including spearheading the implementation of Dr. Bruce Perry's Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics (NMT). Tim developed the trauma informed care training curriculum of how best to understand and implement trauma informed care. Tim has been training and consulting for the past 10 years in Wisconsin and with groups from across the country, teaching diverse professionals and caregivers.
