RACINE COUNTY COVID-19 UPDATE September 21, 2020

Confirmed coronavirus cases

United States: 6,829,956 confirmed, 199,690 deaths

Wisconsin: 102,498 confirmed, 1,337,627 negative, 1,244 deaths

Central Racine County Health Department: 2,104 confirmed (+155 from last week), 217

Updates for the week of September 21:

- The Central Racine County Health Department announced it will open a referral-only, limited-hours testing site for COVID-19. Target groups for testing include residents and people who work in the jurisdiction who are at the highest risk of disease transmission, such as close contacts to a case and people associated with workplace/school outbreaks. Testing will be based on a referral process in which those eligible will be notified of this testing option.
