LAND & WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT FUNDS AVAILABLE

Some eligible conservation projects include grassed waterways, well abandonment, barnyard runoff control and streambank stabilization. Do not hesitate to apply for your cost-share funding today! Kenosha County Land Conservation may provide up to 70% of the cost of your project. Our office allocates over \$50,000 in annual grant monies each year. NUTRIENT MANAGEMENT PLANNING

Are you tired of high fertilizer and fuel costs? Would you like to help protect our groundwater, rivers and lakes? If yes, then developing a nutrient management plan for your farm may be the answer. Kenosha County Land Conservation may be able to help by providing cost-sharing for nutrient management planning on your farm. You can receive up to \$28 per acre to test your soil and follow a 4-year nutrient management plan for your farm. Soil tests can be completed this fall, plans written and followed in spring. 2017 ACREAGE REPORTING DEADLINE IS FAST APPROACHING

In order to comply with FSA program requirements and be eligible for payments, all producers are encouraged to visit the Racine/Kenosha/Milwaukee or Walworth FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline for the 2018 Crop Year:

November 15, 2017: Per ennial Forage, Fall Mint, Fall-seeded small grains, pasture, rangeland, and forage November 20, 2017: Honey Bee Colonies and Maple Sap

January 15, 2018: Apples, Caneberries, Cherries, Cranberries, Currants, Hops, Huckleberries, Pears, Strawberries

Late filed crop reports are \$46 per farm! Postcards are being mailed out to those whom have fall reported in the past. If you do not receive a postcard by 11/1/2017, CALL THE OFFICE IMMEDIATELY! (262) 878-3353 in Union Grove, (262) 723-3216 in Elkhorn.

MARKETING ASSISTANCE LOANS (MALs) ARE AVAILABLE FOR 2017 CROPS

9 month commodity loans (MALs) provide low cost financing and marketing assistance for commodities such as feed grains, soybeans, wheat, wool and honey, just to name a few. MALs provide producers interim financing after harvest to help them meet cash flow needs without having to sell their commodities when market prices are low.

FSAfarm+, FSA's CUSTOMER SELF-SERVICE PORTAL

A new program, known as FSA farm+, provides you with secure access to view your personal FSA data, such as base and yields, HEL and wetland status information, field boundaries and farm imagery. This data will be available in real time, at no cost to the producer and allow operators and owners to export and print farm records, including maps. Producers also can electronically share their data with a crop insurance agent from their own personal computer.

WATERSHED PROTECTION COMMITTEE OF RACINE COUNTY (WPCR): LEADING EFFORTS IN EROSION CONTROL AND WATER QUALITY

The Watershed Protection Committee of Racine County (WPCR) is a team of local farmers who will lead efforts in erosion control, water quality improvement, and providing information to farmers and rural landowners regarding the use of conservation practices. These practices include grassed buffers, streambank protection, cover crops and notill which promote soil health, improve water quality and improve field productivity. The WPCR hosted a field day to demonstrate practices that protect streambanks from erosion. In the wake of recent flooding, WPCR emphasizes the importance of utilizing conservation practices to help keep soil on the field and out of our waterways. Many programs are available to receive funding to implement these practices and event to receive rental payments for cropland taken out of production. Agencies partnering with the WPCR include: Racine County Land Conservation, DATCP, FSA, NRCS, UW Extension, and the Racine County Drainage Board.

FY2018 EQIP SIGNUP

EQIP is the primary program available to farmers for farm and woodland conservation work, offering payments for over 110 basic conservation practices. Last year, Wisconsin received about \$25 million in funds for EQIP practices. By getting applications in early, we have time to visit individual farms to help plan all practices needed and offer advice. It's easier to do an accurate plan before the snow starts, when you can better see the landscape. All eligible applications received by October 20, 2017, will be evaluated, prioritized and ranked for funding in 2018. Farmers and landowners may contact NRCS at 262-878-1243 x 3 to get started on producer eligibility and planning. If you are interested in practices that may require permits, such as manure storage or streambank restoration, begin planning and seeking permits as soon as possible. Applicants with shovel-ready projects (designs completed and permit applications submitted) will receive higher priority.

CONSERVATION CLIENT GATEWAY

Farmers and private landowners can now do business with NRCS through an easily accessible online portal. The Conservation Client Gateway gives producers and entities the ability to work with conservation planners online to access Farm Bill programs, request assistance, and track payments for their conservation activities. Too busy for an office visit? Log in to see maps of your farm, complete applications, file signatures online and more.

The portal enables farmers and private landowners to securely:

- Request NRCS technical and financial assistance.
- Review and sign conservation plans and practice schedules.
- Complete and sign an application for a conservation program.
