October 18, 2022

Chairman Kaprelian called the meeting of the Government Services Committee to order at 6:04 p.m.

5. **New Business**

- a. Presentation by Chief Judge Tim Boyle and Racine County Clerk of Courts Sam Christensen

Chief Judge Boyle presented a general background of the Racine County court system, which is part of State District 2: Kenosha, Walworth and Racine Counties, and consists of ten judges who cover six criminal courts including misdemeanor and juvenile, felony, civil, and family; and probate and traffic courts. Racine County also has two specialty courts: Drug and Veteran's. Vets court usually has 10-12 participants and mentors. Drug court can include 30-40 participants. A successful graduation rate is 50%. Judges rotate every 2 years and it can be challenging to place judges in the right courts. Due to the increased crime rate, the caseload for felony courts is high. The courts functioned well during COVID. Crimes involving guns has caused an increase in filings.

Clerk Christensen described the role of the Clerk of Courts office. His duties lie in four major areas: 1. Record retention, as his office holds all documents filed with courts; 2. Court administration: making court happen and the courtrooms ready with everything that the judges need; 3. Court finances, including fines, filing fees, etc, and restitution and collection; and 4. Jury management. He oversees approximately 50 employees who are in several County buildings. The increase of court cases does cause a strain on his office. Traffic citations are down from pre-COVID but are rising again. Discussion ensued.

- b. Youth in Governance Annual Report and Program Outreach Plan by Pamela Behrndt Larson

Pam Larson, Youth Development Educator for UW-Madison, Extension Racine County, provided an

overview of the Racine County Youth in Governance 2021-2022 Program Report. The Youth in Governance representatives were the 8th group to participant in the program. 66 youth were nominated by 28 community members. 31 youth were interviewed by the Government Services Committee. Seven of the nine remaining YIG representatives completed the end-of-program evaluation. Respondents indicated that there was an increase in the average value of all eight questions related to civic engagement and all six questions related to leadership. Additionally, youth reported that they felt supported in their roles and were grateful to their mentors and committee members for providing a welcoming, supportive environment. Program recommendations were shared and discussed.

Larson explained the outreach process for the 2023-2024 Racine County Youth in Governance Program. Outreach documents were shared and discussed by committee members. Supervisors who are mentors for YIG representatives will support youth representatives with outreach within the school districts. Nominations close on December 16, 2022. RESOLUTION NO. 2022-64

RESOLUTION BY INDIVIDUAL SUPERVISORS REQUESTING THE STATE OF WISCONSIN REVISE THE CURRENT REAL ESTATE TRANSFER FEE REVENUE SHARING FORMULA

To the Honorable Members of the Racine County Board of Supervisors:

WHEREAS, the collection by counties of a real estate transfer fee was mandated by the State of Wisconsin in 1969, and included a requirement that counties remit 50% of all transfer fees collected to the State; and

WHEREAS, in 1981, the State arbitrarily changed the transfer fee formula to require counties to remit the State 80% of all transfer fees collected; and

WHEREAS, Racine County, through the Register of Deeds office, assumes the annual operating costs of recording all real estate transfers occurring in Racine County, including the collection of real estate transfer fees; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, Racine County collected \$4,231,438.20 in real estate transfer fees with the County's 20% retained share totaling \$846,287.64, and was required to remit 80% or \$3,385,150.56 to the State; and

WHEREAS, Racine County real estate transfer fee collections over the past five years totaled \$16,511,868.00, of which the County retained \$3,302,373.60; and over that same period \$13,209,494.40 was remitted to the State; and

WHEREAS, in 2021, the State of Wisconsin has reportedly built up a budget surplus of approximately \$2.5 billion dollars, while many Wisconsin counties continue to struggle financially due to the ever-increasing costs of providing county government services in an inflationary economy, coupled with the financial restrictions imposed by State mandated levy limits; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to financially assist all Wisconsin Counties, Racine County requests that the State of Wisconsin modify and return the real estate transfer fee share formula to again allow Wisconsin Counties to retain 50% of all total real estate fees collected, with 50% to be remitted to the State; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Racine County Board of Supervisors that the State of Wisconsin is hereby requested to revise the real estate transfer fee share formula to again allow Wisconsin counties to retain 50% of all real estate transfer fees collected, with 50% to be remitted to the State; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Racine County Board of Supervisors that a copy of this resolution is sent to Governor Tony Evers, all members of the State Legislature representing Racine County, the Wisconsin Counties Association, and all other Wisconsin counties.

WHEREAS, Waupaca County appreciates the sacrifices of our United State Military Personnel and believes specific recognition should be granted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED with designation as a Green Light for Veterans County, Waupaca County hereby declares from October through Veterans Day, November 11th 2022 a time to salute and honor the service and sacrifice of our men and women in uniform transitioning from Active Service; that in observance of Operation Green Light, Waupaca County encourages its citizens in patriotic tradition to recognize the importance of honoring all those who made immeasurable sacrifices to preserve freedom by displaying a green light in a window of their place of business or residence.



WHEREAS, Voters need to be able to trust that their local election officials are acting in a non-partisan capacity and are not under the influence of private resources that might impact how an election is administered.

WHEREAS, The ability to accept private funds for election administration can be used by any political party or special interest group to improperly influence the outcome of elections.

WHEREAS, In order to have a well-functioning election, voters need to have trust in the fairness of the process.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Sawyer County Board of Supervisors insists upon the prohibition of the use of private donations from special interest groups, people, or other private entities by government for the purposes of election administration.


