5. New Business

a. Presentation by Corporation Counsel – Nature of Relationship Between County Board and Constitutional Officers

Corporation Counsel Lanzdorf presented the relevant law, i.e., State Chapter 59, and the definition and limitations of County Board's organizational and administrative powers. The County Executive oversees the administrative duties of the County. Constitutional Officers are the local presence of the State on Statewide matters. There is no typical employer-employee relationship. The Board's most obvious responsibility in regard to the Constitutional Officers is approving the annual County budget, including the sufficient resources to have the Constitutional Officers carry out their duties in accordance with State statues. For example, the Sheriff's Office is established and defined by the Constitution, and the Sheriff's duties are described, and Lanzdorf explained how the County Board does not have the authority to control how the Sheriff exercises those duties, as related to their office, unless it is considered "ordinary", such as choosing a food service in the jail, approval of a contract, or authorizing the acceptance of a grant.

Chairman Kaprelian asked for further clarification regarding the Government Services committee role and responsibilities. Clerk Christensen explained the history of the committee, and Corporation Counsel Lanzdorf reiterated that the current definition of the committee is still viable. Discussion ensued.

b. Resolution No. 2022-64 Racine County RESOLUTION BY INDIVIDUAL SUPERVISORS REQUESTING THE STATE OF WISCONSIN REVISE THE CURRENT REAL ESTATE TRANSFER FEE REVENUE SHARING FORMULA

Supervisor Trottier explained the resolution asks the State to change the real estate transfer fee collected by the County from the current 80/20 split with the State to a 50/50 split with the State. This would result

in increased revenue for the County. Discussion ensued.

REPORT BY THE COUNTY EXECUTIVE APPOINTING THE RACINE COUNTY MEDICAL EXAMINER

To the Honorable Members of the Racine County Board of Supervisors:

The position of Medical Examiner became vacant upon the retirement of Michael Payne. To succeed Mr. Payne as Medical Examiner, I am appointing:

KRISTAN BINNINGER

Binninger began her career as a deputy medical examiner with Kenosha County in 2011. She has extensive medicolegal death investigator experience. Binninger is a board-certified medicolegal death investigator with The American Board of Medicolegal Death Investigators, Inc. since 2014 and has led or participated in over 2,000 deaths. Binninger's responsibilities have included but were not limited to scene investigation, family notification, transportation of decedents, autopsy preparations, and evidence preservation. She also possesses a certification in phlebotomy from The American Society for Clinical Pathology.

Therefore, I ask for your confirmation of Kristan Binninger as the Racine County Medical Examiner.

Resolution 51-22

Requesting the State of Wisconsin to Review and Revise the Compensation Rate for Assistant District Attorneys

WHEREAS, Assistant District Attorneys (ADAs) serve as the backbone of the State of Wisconsin's ability to effectively prosecute cases in all of its seventy-two counties; and

WHEREAS, any shortage of these ADAs creates backlogs in the justice system, which can lengthen cases, create more pressure on existing staff and delay or deny justice to the victims in these cases; and

WHEREAS, the entry-level compensation rate for ADAs in Wisconsin in 2022 sits at \$26.70 per hour, which is annualized to approximately \$55,000 per year, and the pay structure for experienced prosecutors is, likewise, extraordinarily low; and

WHEREAS, the compensation rate for ADAs, both entry-level and experienced, has not kept up with the rate of inflation, sits well below other public sector attorney positions around the State of Wisconsin, is not competitive in today's workforce environment, accelerates staffing turnover in District Attorney offices around the state of Wisconsin and, ultimately, endangers public safety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the State of Wisconsin is hereby requested to review and revise the entry-level compensation rate for Assistant District Attorneys and the pay schedule for experienced Assistant District Attorneys in order to make them competitive with other public sector attorney positions as well as to keep up with the rate of inflation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution is sent to Governor Tony Evers, all members of the Wisconsin State Legislature representing Price County, the Wisconsin Counties Association and all other Wisconsin Counties.

INTRODUCED BY: Land & Water Resources Committee

SYNOPSIS: Authorization to Conduct a County-wide Referendum on Clean Water Now for Wisconsin

WHEREAS, the Juneau County Board of Supervisors is concerned about the right of its citizens to clean water; and

WHEREAS, there are numerous indicators that the citizens of Juneau County, and Wisconsin as a whole, are concerned about clean drinking water and clean lakes because of the health of the people and the economic impact on the people;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Juneau County Board of Supervisors shall and hereby does approve that the following question shall be placed on the November 8, 2022 ballot as an advisory referendum: Question: Should the State of Wisconsin establish a right to clean water to protect human health, the environment, and the diverse cultural and natural heritage of Wisconsin?

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Juneau County Corporation Counsel shall prepare a Notice of Referendum to be published by the Juneau County Clerk in accordance with statutory requirements; and

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution and the referendum shall be filed with the Juneau County Clerk no later than 70 days prior to the November 8, 2022 election at which the question will appear on the ballot; and

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk is directed to send results of the referendum to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin Counties Association, the Wisconsin Towns Association, the Wisconsin League of Municipalities, all members of the State Legislature, and to each Wisconsin County Board.
