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JOINT RESOLUTION BY THE FINANCE AND HUMAN RESOURCES AND THE PUBLIC WORKS, PARKS, AND FACILITIES COMMITTEES AUTHORIZING ACCEPTANCE AND ADOPTION OF THE U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS INTEGRATED FEASIBILITY REPORT AND ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT OF THE HORLICK DAM, AND ITS RECOMMENDATION TO PROCEED WITH REMOVAL OF THE HORLICK DAM

**RESOLUTION NO. 2023-**

To the Honorable Members of the Racine County Board of Supervisors:

**WHEREAS**, Racine County owns the Horlick Dam, located approximately 6 miles upstream of Lake Michigan and about 100 yards north of the Highway 38 (Northwestern Avenue) bridge; and

**WHEREAS**, the Horlick Dam was constructed in 1834, and operated as a gristmill until 1870, and, following reconstructions, contributed to a significant loss of natural parameters and process that sustain and create native riverine and riparian habitats; and

**WHEREAS**, Horlick Dam was rebuilt in 1975, to replace the previously deteriorating structure in accordance with recommendations of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Council (SEWRPC), pursuant to Resolution Nos. 1975-103, 1975-104S, and 1975-192; and

**WHEREAS**, the current Horlick Dam continues to fragment the Root River and is recognized by the DNR as the most significant fish passage obstruction on the Root River, blocking upstream passage to 160 miles of river and tributary habitat and an estimated 6,176 acres of connected wetlands; and

**WHEREAS**, Horlick Dam presents additional safety security concerns, including dam/structural failure, high flow hazards, boater/fishing safety, and foot access hazards; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 31, Wisconsin Statutes, and Chapters NR 333 and NR 116, Wisconsin Administrative Code, the DNR has concluded that the Horlick Dam is not able to pass the 100-year flood without overtopping through its spillway; and

**WHEREAS**, the DNR further required the spillway capacity of the Horlick Dam to be brought into full compliance with NR 333, Wisconsin Administrative Code, within 10 years from the date of the DNR's decision on April 22, 2014 (*i.e.*, April 22, 2024); and

WHEREAS, in the many years that followed the DNR's April 22, 2014 decision, Racine County has undertaken a deliberate and exhaustive review of options to bring Horlick Dam into compliance with NR 333, Wisconsin Administrative Code, guided by the following principles: finding the most cost effective, technically feasible and acceptable solution to meet controlling flood protection requirements, and restore ecological integrity and water quality to the impacted portion of the Root River; and

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**WHEREAS**, similarly, SEWRPC has been working for the past decade on plans to upgrade or remove the dam, which has no commercial use (such as producing electricity or powering a mill); and

**WHEREAS**, alternatives to either improve the spillway capacity or remove the dam were evaluated by SEWRPC and documented in Community Assistance Planning Report No. 316, *A Restoration Plan for the Root River Watershed*, July 2014 (CAPR 316); and

**WHEREAS**, in that report, SEWRPC concluded in pertinent part that, "[b]ased on environmental considerations – including water quality, fish community effects, and flooding, the [Root River] plan recommends that the [Horlick] dam be removed."; and

**WHEREAS**, Racine County, by Resolution No. 2014-42, and the City of Racine, by Resolution No. 15-0278, formally adopted (each by unanimous vote) the SEWRPC Report No. 316, *A Restoration Plan for the Root River Watershed*, with each entity noting it "is a valuable guide to the development of not only the watershed, but the community, and that the adoption of such plan ... will assure a common understanding by the several governmental levels and agencies concerned and enable these levels and agencies of government to program [and plan] the necessary area wide and local implementation work;" and

**WHEREAS**, in 2017, Racine County was awarded a \$100,000.00 grant from the Fund for Lake Michigan to study options for bringing the Horlick Dam into DNR compliance; and

**WHEREAS**, thereafter, by Resolution No. 2019-106, Racine County authorized participation in the DNR Dam Grant Program, whereby the County requested financial assistance under s. 31.385 and s. 227.11, Wisconsin State Statutes, and NR 335, Wisconsin Administrative Code, for the purpose of dam compliance which could include modification or abandonment and removal; and

**WHEREAS**, by Resolution No. 2019-127, Racine County authorized the Public Works and Development Services Department to accept the Fund for Lake Michigan grant for the Horlick Dam study; and

WHEREAS, Racine County requested that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Chicago District (USACE) initiate a study under the Great Lakes Fishery & Ecosystem Restoration (GLFER) authority per Section 506 of the Water Resources Development Act of 2000, as amended, to ascertain the feasibility of restoring important riverine habitat and connectivity for fish, mussels, and wildlife along an approximately 6.5-mile reach on the Root River that is affected by the presence of the Horlick Dam; and

 **WHEREAS**, Section 506(a)(2) states, "the Great Lakes fishery and ecosystem should be developed and enhanced in a coordinated manner" which authorizes the Secretary of the Army to carry out a program of aquatic ecosystem restoration with the objective of restoring degraded ecosystem structure, function, and dynamic processes to a less degraded, more natural condition considering the ecosystem's natural integrity, productivity, stability, and biological diversity; and

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**WHEREAS**, the need for the USACE project was driven by the presence of an impoundment that has changed riverine habitat (lotic) to lake-like (lentic) conditions, induced abnormal hydrogeomorphic settings, fragmented the river system, degraded substrate transport and sorting above and below the dam, and degraded water quality; and

**WHEREAS**, the resulting Root River Ecosystem Restoration study, entitled the Integrated Feasibility Report/Environmental Assessment (IFR/EA) of that the project, was deemed warranted for federal participation based on a feasibility level assessment of estimated costs, potential benefits, and possible environmental impacts of various alternatives; and

**WHEREAS**, the Horlick Dam IFR/EA concludes – through an exhaustive analysis of various alternatives and potential effects – that the recommended plan known as the National Ecosystem Restoration (NER) plan takes into consideration costs, habitat benefits, USACE policy, risk and uncertainty along with plan acceptability, completeness, efficiency, and effectiveness, and includes:

- Demolition and removal of the Horlick Dam to the natural bedrock elevation;
- Incremental removal of the Horlick Dam to ensure that restored sediment transport does not exceed the average annual sediment budget for a stream and watershed of this size and type;
- Appropriate recycling and disposal of all man-made materials generated from the dam demolition and removal;
- Use of machinery and equipment specifically designed and environmentally safe for aquatic work;
- Sowing of temporary native cover crops on exposed banks, new upland soils or fine sediment bars that become exposed during the incremental dewatering and removal process;
- A three-year construction period to support staged removal, monitoring, and adaptive management;
- A three-year post construction monitoring period to determine success and future sustainability; and
- Finding that, while dam removal may have temporary short-term impacts from construction, it is not expected to result in long-term significant net adverse impacts to recreation (e.g., kayaking, fishing, etc.); and
- Finding that dam removal would not have any direct or indirect, long-term significant adverse effects to resident and migratory birds and has the potential to provide beneficial impacts with the newly exposed riparian habitat.

**WHEREAS**, in February 2024, Racine County requested an extension of the NR 333 compliance deadline based upon the feasibility study conducted by the USACE and its estimated schedule of design and construction milestones for bringing the dam into DNR compliance; and

**WHEREAS**, that request was approved and the NR 333 compliance deadline for Horlick Dam spillway capacity was moved to December 31, 2025; and

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**WHEREAS**, SEWRPC and the Root-Pike Watershed Initiative Network have indicated support for the USACE's findings and recommendation for removal of the Horlick Dam as set forth above; and

**WHEREAS**, a public meeting on the USACE's findings was held on June 14, 2023, and public review of the draft Horlick Dam IFR/EA was completed on June 30, 2023; and

**WHEREAS**, a public hearing was held before the Racine County Public Works, Parks, and Facilities Committee on March 14, 2024.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Racine County Board of Supervisors that Racine County hereby accepts and adopts the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Integrated Feasibility Report and Environmental Assessment of the Horlick Dam, and its recommendation to proceed with removal of the Horlick Dam; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** by the Racine County Board of Supervisors that any two of the County Clerk, the County Executive, and/or the Racine County Board Chairman are authorized to execute any contracts, agreements, amendments, or other documents necessary to carry out the intent of this resolution, except that the commitment of Racine County's specific cost share as the local cost-sharing sponsor for the dam removal project will be set forth in the Project Partnership Agreement (PPA) and separately authorized by action of the Racine County Board of Supervisors.
